4412 Kai Resilience Project receives a welcome funding boost.

The project which is now in its implementation stage has just received welcome support from the <u>Lottery</u> <u>Community Fund</u> and the <u>Horizons Regional Council</u> <u>Community Climate Response Fund</u> for key projects linked to it.

Andrew Watt, who is the Kairuruku Hohenga Ähuarangi/Climate Action Coordinator for Horizons notes 'Localised food production and food security can both reduce transport emissions and increase community resilience to climate change. The growing gardens and communities mahi will also produce co-benefits of healthy kai and empowering whānau to grow their own kai. Horizons Regional Council are pleased to offer support for this project through the first funding round of the Pūtea Hapori Urupare Ahuarangi,-Community Climate Response Fund.'
